Cathedral dedication stone visits area parishes Granite stone blessed by Pope Francis; touring diocese

KNOXVILLE--- It weighs 19.5 pounds and is roughly the size of an ordinary ceiling tile, but a granite slab mined from property in East Tennessee symbolizes the Diocese of Knoxville's connection with Pope Francis and the universal Catholic Church.

The dedication stone that will be placed inside the new Cathedral of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus that is under construction in Knoxville is making a pilgrimage across East Tennessee. The stone's next stops are:

March 18-19: Holy Cross Catholic Church, 144 Wears Valley Road, Pigeon Forge, TN 37863

March 25-26: St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church, 7719 River Road, Townsend, TN 37882

April 1-2: Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church, 858 Louisville Road, Alcoa, TN 37701

The cathedral dedication stone was carried to Rome in 2015 by Bishop Richard F. Stika of the Diocese of Knoxville. He was accompanied by Cardinal Justin A. Rigali. The stone was blessed by Pope Francis on Oct. 14, 2015, at the Vatican.

While the stone visits area Catholic churches, it will be displayed in a wooden case along with a photo of the blessing by Pope Francis and a short history, a reflection, and a prayer.

The stone will visit all 51 parishes and mission churches, and all 10 Catholic schools in the Diocese of Knoxville before being placed in the cathedral for its dedication on March 3, 2018.
